The 25th Jubilee Celebration of Jeanne Jugan Residence in San Pedro



On Thursday, July 26, 1979, Feast of St. Ann, the Little Sisters of the Poor, their Residents and friends gathered for the blessing of the Jeanne Jugan statue.

The blessing ceremony provided a break in the flurry of activity in progress for the relocation – both for those from St. Ann's in Boyle Heights who were packing belongings and stacking up luggage and for those at the new Home who were unloading, decorating and moving everything in.

On Saturday, June 19, 2004, the Little Sisters of the Poor Auxiliary will host their 7th annual LSPAdventure:

Celebrating the Silver

a gala fund-raising event to recognize the 25th Jubilee of the Little Sisters of the Poor in San Pedro.

Over the past 25 years, the Little Sisters have welcomed nearly 600 needy elderly into their Home and lovingly cared for them as part of their family.

"Faithful to the spirit of our Mother Foundress Blessed Jeanne Jugan, we dedicate this issue of *Time & Life* to our benefactors and friends whose kindness and generosity made this possible," states Mother Marguerite, superior of the Home. "To those who were with us 25 years ago, those who remain with us still and to those who have joined us since, we thank you for being the hands of God reaching out to provide dignity and love to your elderly brothers and sisters. The joy you bring to them when they are so vulnerable is truly a witness to the goodness of God."

Groundbreaking, October 26, 1977

On October 26, 1977, the Little Sisters of the Poor broke ground for their new home for the aged.

Just a year prior, on September 7, 1976, the Little Sisters had announced to the city that St. Ann's, their current home, would have to be closed. After 71 years of sheltering the elderly poor in Los Angeles, the Home at 2700 E. First St. no longer met current fire code requirements. The Little Sisters and their 150 Residents would have to move.

Cardinal Timothy Manning also announced that the Archdiocese of Los Angeles would give the former Fermin Lasuen High School (closed in 1971) in San Pedro to the Little Sisters.

"There was a possibility that the presence of the Sisters among





us might terminate. This would have been a calamity for our city. For its part, the Archdiocese of Los Angeles was most anxious to come to the aid of the Sisters."

"We trust that this action of the Archdiocese will stimulate our citizens to an awareness of this great project and a corresponding financial assistance according to each one's means. May God prosper the work."

Rejoicing with gratitude for the gift of the property, the Little Sisters developed plans to build a new four-story, 120 bed building on the campus. The existing school building would be used for administrative, medical and social services as well as a convent for the Little Sisters.

A fund-raising drive for the \$5 million was organized with leadership from Edmund Schnieders, a former director of Security Pacific Bank. He was assisted by the participation of other local volunteer businessmen. (See page 7)

Mr. Schnieders was the Master of ceremonies for the Groundbreaking event. He reported to the crowd of 200 that the Little Sisters had obtained half of the \$5 million needed for the new Home.

Assemblyman Vincent Thomas, in whose district the new Home would be located, told of growing up in Boyle Heights and often seeing St. Ann's Home on East 1st St. He recalled how the Little Sisters came to his family's home seeking alms. He also spoke of his roots in San Pedro.

"When the school [Fermin] closed I had a sad feeling," said Mr. Thomas. "Now that has changed to joy."

Participating at the Groundbreaking were Bishop John J. Ward, State Assemblyman Vincent Thomas, Los Angeles City councilman John Gibson and Ross Valencia, representing Councilman Arthur Snyder.

Topping Off, June 27, 1978

Bishop Ward then blessed the ground with the words "May the work begun today be the beginning of the work which will bring honor to your name, Lord, and may your love, peace and joy permeate all those involved."

In the months following the Groundbreaking, the cruciform shape of the new Residence became visible as the foundations were dug and the steel framework grew up toward the heavens.

On June 27, 1978, a special ceremony was planned for the "topping off" of the new Home. Fifty-five Residents and fifty employees from St. Ann's made the trip by bus with the Little Sisters for the celebration.

"We felt the presence of St. Joseph smiling on this beautiful day. Again, he had shown himself to be a powerful intercessor on our behalf," said Sister Paul, who remembers the event as a time of great optimism.

The Grotto Blessing, February 11, 1979







ne of the most beautiful spots in the garden of St. Ann's was the grotto of Our Lady of Lourdes. Many processions and expressions of faith took place there.

During the digging of the foundation for the new Home, huge boulders were unearthed giving rise to the vision for the new grotto. The construction company relocated the boulders to the back side yard (photo). Little Sisters and their employees began to collect other stones from the canyons nearby.

A grotto was designed and built by four employees of Mexican heritage: (L to R in photo) Michael Rangel-Ramirez, who remains an employee of the Little Sisters today and is the Begging Van driver; his father Juan Ramirez who was the Begging Van driver at the time; Filipe Macedo, who is also an employee today; and Vincent Ibarra.

They worked very hard carrying the stones and placing each one in just the right place. Devotion to Our Lady is central to Mexican culture and piety. Therefore, the four men considered it a great privilege to build this shrine and to transfer the statues of Our Lady and St. Bernadette from St. Ann's to the new Home in San Pedro.

The dedication took place on Sunday, February 11, 1979. It was the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes in the year marking the Centenary of St. Bernadette's death, as well as that of Mother Foundress Blessed Jeanne Jugan.

The Residents, employees, their families, and a few volunteers and friends came for the dedication. Two buses were rented for the day. One was a wheelchair bus for the infirm Residents.

Msgr. Donald Montrose, whose parents had lived at St. Ann's, officiated at the ceremony, along with Fr. Maurice Evans, a Resident priest and Fr. Patrick Peyton C.S.C. (Congregation of Holy Cross). Fr. Peyton had a great love for Our Lady and was a friend of the Little Sisters in L.A. He was the founder of the Family Theater and famous for the saying "The family that prays together, stays together."

The ceremony included the Lourdes hymn, the liturgical prayers of blessing, a decade of the Rosary, and words of gratitude to the grotto builders. The successful and speedy

completion of the new Home was confided to Our Lady.

Refreshments were served to everyone present. Many of the Residents walked around to see the progress of the construction.

Today, the Grotto remains a focal point of many celebrations of the Home. In recent years, the Knights of Malta have assisted many of the infirm Residents to experience the comfort and healing of the original Lourdes through participation in the annual Lourdes Day.

mid tears and smiles, acceptance and anticipation, the Little Sisters of the Poor moved their 120 aged Residents from St. Ann's Home to the new Residence in San Pedro.

The day began at St. Ann's with a Mass of Thanksgiving for all the blessings and graces received since the opening of the Home in LA.

After breakfast, the Residents began to gather with their few belongings. Their clothing had been moved to San Pedro already and placed in the rooms they had previously picked to be their own.

Residents wore fresh carnations and name tags. They were introduced to volunteer drivers from Pasadena, Hollywood, Santa Monica, Los Angeles, San Marino and the Palos Verdes Peninsula who took them for the ride down the Harbor Freeway.

Employees who were not coming to work in San Pedro, had to say good-bye to the dear Residents they had been caring for and grown to love. They promised to visit.

Reporters and three television stations were on hand. They spoke to the Residents for the evening news cast.

In San Pedro, at the new home, there was controlled confusion. The Little Sisters had been at work for weeks preparing the rooms. Many had flown in from Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul, Phoenix, and San Francisco to help.

The nearby parishes of St. John Fisher, St. Lawrence Martyr, Holy Trinity, St. Peter, and Mary Star of the Sea provided volunteers to help set up housekeeping.

On Moving Day, Mother Provincial Marguerite and Sr. Antoinette, who was on hand to welcome the first Residents in 1915, were at the door to provide a welcome of hospitality. Each aged person was received with warmth and love; accompanied individually by a volunteer to his or her new room before joining others for a box lunch.

Welcome cards along with a rose in a small white vase were in each of the Resident's rooms. One of the volunteers commented, "This has to be real love."

The Little Sisters have great appreciation and fondness for their dedicated employees and volunteers, past and present, who, by their actions, share in the ministry to the elderly.

ardinal Timothy Manning arrived with his secretary, Msgr. Clement Connolly for the blessing of the Cornerstone at 1:30 P.M..

Msgr. Thomas Kiefer, pastor of Mary Star of the Sea and whose parents the Little Sisters had cared for, welcomed those present. He mentioned that Jeanne Jugan had grown up in a seaport town, similar to San Pedro, and the Residents of the new Home now had the privilege of gazing on the ocean view, just as she must have done during the years she lived in Cancale, France.

After the Blessing of the cornerstone, Cardinal Manning went to bless the new Home while the twelve concelebrants and guests went to the Chapel.

The Liturgy of Thanksgiving began at 2:00 P.M. with Mary Star of the Sea Choir providing the music for the occasion. Cardinal Manning gave the homily during which he said:

"The Spirit of love, devotion and generosity seems more active in the Church than ever before in history. This Home is one example of such love, devotion and generosity. This is a sanctifying and holy work that goes on in this Home, and that we are being asked to participate in today."

After Mass, Cardinal Manning greeted the Residents and guests outside the Chapel before joining them in the auditorium for refreshments. There the Little Sisters were able to approach the Cardinal individually to thank him for his generous support and prayers.

Many guests toured the Home for the first time. Returning to the auditorium, they delighted in the songfest performed by Residents who declared *thank you* for their new Home.

The day ended in a joyful thankful spirit of peace as the benefactors and guests left. They had helped the Little Sisters see the reality of this new Home!

For the next three Sundays Jeanne Jugan Residence was open for tours. Over 2,000 people from the area and Los Angeles visited the new home and generously expressed their support for the work of the Little Sisters of the Poor.
