On August 30th, we celebrated the Feast Day of St. Jeanne Jugan, recognizing her as the "saint for old age and every age."

Jeanne gave herself entirely to the elderly poor, and lived out her belief that every life has value, regardless of age or financial status. She encouraged her aged brothers and sisters to live life to the fullest and to use their gifts as long as possible.

As the elderly population continues to grow and dignity at the end of life is increasingly threatened, Jeanne Jugan's message of respect for life is more important today than ever. In confirmation of her message, one need only read the recent statement by the US bishops entitled "To Live Each Day with Dignity."*

"When we grow old or sick and we are tempted to lose heart, we should be surrounded by people who ask 'How can we help?'. We deserve to grow old in a society that views our cares and needs with a compassion grounded in respect, offering genuine support in our final days," the bishops conclude.

According to Mother Paul, "We are blessed to have St. Jeanne Jugan as an example of compassion and love for the elderly. It is a privilege to give witness to her legacy in our own Home by giving our Residents the comfort, safety, and care they so rightly deserve."

St. Jeanne Jugan is a shining example of faith, kindness, and humility to everyone. We are grateful for her wisdom and simple goodness. Let us rejoice, especially on her feast day, that we all, along with the elderly, have a faithful friend and intercessor for our many petitions.

Sr. Clotilde chose to dedicate her jubilee to Our Lady of Fatima. Both of her parents were from the Madeira Islands of Portugal. From them she learned a special devotion to Our Lady of Fatima which she and her family holds very dear to their hearts. Her brothers George and Philip and sister Judy along with other family members joined the celebration. (#3)

Mass was followed by a delicious dinner including jubilee cake (#4).

"The entertainment theme for her party was Disneyland," explains Bing Vargas, Activities Director. "It is her favorite place to visit. We had the full cast – Pirates of the Caribbean (#5), the Seven Dwarfs, the Mickey Mouse Club, and more (#6)." Sr. Clotilde was educated and guided in her faith by the Adrian Dominican Sisters. During high school, she became a Marian Aid volunteering at the home of the Little Sisters of the Poor in Oakland. Over the ensuing months, she became more and more attracted to the community and prayer life of the Little Sisters and decided to join the order. She was professed on June 13, 1961. Since then, she has served in 23 Homes.

The Blessing of New Vocations

A fter an eight day retreat to prepare for a joyful and serious commitment in their lives, on Friday July 15th, seven young women from three countries entered our novitiate in Queens Village. They received their white veils and religious names. The Sisters chose their own names, which often reflect their personal devotions or may be related to a beloved family member. As novices they will complete a two-year period of prayer and study, culminating in temporary profession of vows.

As exciting as Friday was, Saturday brought more joy when four novices made their first profession of vows. The ceremony was presided by Archbishop Charles J. Chaput O.F.M., Cap, Administrator of the Archdiocese of Denver, who will be installed as the 9th Archbishop of Philadelphia on September 8th.

Archbishop Chaput was delighted to witness this special day for one of his own, Sister Mary Alexandra, who is from Colorado.

The profession Mass was especially beautiful with accents from different cultures. Readings and songs in Tongan and Korean were included, and our Korean Little Sister pronounced her vows in her native language so that her mother would understand. In a first-ever, Archbishop Chaput initiated applause after each Little Sister pronounced her vows.
