Learning about the Home

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As most of you may already know Rita Swartz, retired last October. I also had a temporary retirement to care for my Mom, leaving my position as the Executive Director of a large nonprofit in Orange County after eight years of being at that position and twelve at the organization. After eight months, my mom was on the mend and so I decided to go back to work, however, it needed to be close to home. Rita and I met, and I truly believe that divine intervention happened at our meeting — I started my new position as the Development Director of Jeanne Jugan Residence on August 18, 2014. Needless to say I was excited and nervous; Rita had been here for thirteen years and had done fantastic work. I knew I had big shoes to fill.

Growing up in San Pedro I have been fortunate to know about Little Sisters of the Poor. I was told stories of my grandmother volunteering at the original location in Boyle Heights in Los Angeles. My parents, aunts and uncles all have volunteered at the San Pedro location. When we were younger they would bring my sister and I to the San Pedro Home to volunteer in the ice cream parlor. As a young person I always understood the home to be for the elderly poor and that the Little Sisters did great work in the community to assist those less fortunate than us.

Since August, I have learned more about what happens inside the walls of our Home. Here are a few things:

1) No one who lives in the home is wealthy - in order to be eligible to live here they must be 65 years of age and they must have no more than \$20,000 a year income. The Residents are of all religions, race and ethnic backgrounds.

2) The Catholic Church does not directly fund the Little Sisters.

Saint Jeanne Jugan, the foundress of the Little Sisters of the Poor, was a humble beggar, gathering what was needed to care for the elderly poor in her home. They beg daily in the markets and places of business for food and commodities to offset operating expenses. They also make appeals in the Catholic parishes to build friendships and support for the day to day expenses. A Simple Note By: Mother Superior



As we prepare for the beautiful time of spring, when everything begins to renew itself and open itself to new life, the Holy Father reminds us of the true meaning of the word repent. The word literally means "to think beyond the way we think now, to turn around and think in a different way". The call to repentance by Jesus, and the real call of Lent, is to take a new look at God, to refresh our image of him. It is to come to a vivid realization that God loves us now, as we are, and before ever we change. The main thing in Lent is not that we should do things for God but that we should become more aware of how much God is doing for us. Each day we want to see more and more that God loves us powerfully, unfailingly, permanently.

Lent is also a time when we need to turn round and think in a different way about the pressing issues of our times. It is a time for renewing our commitment to protecting human dignity and promoting human rights. This means addressing the grave problems of poverty, hunger and unemployment, not least by protecting the abundant resources of the earth and sharing them more equitably.

Pope Francis stated in his meeting with the elderly at St. Peter's Square, "Old age, in particular is a time of grace, in which the Lord will renew his call: He calls us to preserve and transmit the faith, calls us to pray, especially to intercede; calls us to be close to those who maybe in need." The elderly – grandparents especially have a capacity to understand the most difficult situations: a great ability and when they pray for these situations, their prayer is strong. It is powerful. "The Holy Father went on to warn again losing sight of and appreciation for the inestimable worth of those, who are in twilight of life. A people that do not have care for the elderly that does not treat them well, has no future: Such person loses its memory and its roots."

So as we journey through Lent may we open our hearts more fully as Saint Jeanne Jugan did to think differently in our commitment to protecting human dignity for the elderly in our community.

Thank you to our Parish Pastors for allowing Little Sisters of the Poor, the opportunity to place our newsletter near the bulletins to share our appeals with their parishioners.

Our Sisters have been in the Los Angeles area since 1905, first in Boyle Heights and then after the Sylmar earthquake damaged our home we moved in 1979 to San Pedro on the old Fermin Lasuen High School property. Our story began quite a while before that, in a little fishing village on the west coast of France. There was a woman named Jeanne Jugan, she was poor and 47 years old, Jeanne always knew that God wanted her. She never knew exactly why.

Jeanne did day work for the wealthy families around the town, and one night coming home from work she discovered an elderly neighbor left alone — blind, paralyzed, alone because her sister who cared for her was now in the hospital dying.

More poor elderly moved into Jeanne's apartment, girls from the neighborhood came to help, and seeing the need, they took a great leap of faith in Providence, left their cozy apartment, and moved down the street into an abandoned café. (There were a lot of older women in St. Servan without support because, as I said, it was, and still is, a fishing town. They had lost their husbands and their sons at sea. Jeanne herself was a sailor's orphan.) Jeanne somehow found room for twelve guests, and soon she had twelve guests and no money. So she turned to the neighbors for help — the markets, businesses, parish and the wealthy families for whom she had worked for about twenty years by then. was room for forty. Jeanne went begging to the next town. However, each town had the same problem with homeless elderly, and they wanted her to stay and open a home. Jeanne opened up another home, and it was full before long. This happened again and again throughout France.

Jeanne kept going where she was needed. Today the Little Sisters are in thirty-one countries, trying to do the same thing that she did with the same faith in Divine Providence that she left us; making as home-like and happy a home as we can for those who come to us and can't keep it together financially any more, or see the day coming all to quickly when they won't be able to. As one pastor said, "we give them a safe place to live and sure of the presence of the sisters until the end, a safe place to die."

We still turn to our neighbors for help — markets, businesses, parishes throughout the Los Angeles area. Our home has 100 Residents, and each year the Little Sisters must raise 60% of our operating cost from gifts, bequest, and donated commodities and church collections. We would never make ends meet if we didn't receive donations. We say that the Lord sends his friends, and they keep us going. Once, when Jeanne was trying to open a new home, the city would not give her a permit.... "If God fills the house, he will not abandon it," she said. And that's how the story has gone ever since. The house has always been full, and it has never been abandoned.

Later, they found a bigger place, and then there
